UPDATE ON THE JOHN BISSELL SCHOLARS FUND – A NOTE FROM KATHERINE ALLEN:

I recently returned from India where I heard great stories about the American visitors at the school this winter. These memorable encounters in remote Rajasthan allow the students to feel like true global citizens.

As some of you know, I have been working with Fabindia since 1993 and started assisting with the John Bissell Scholars Fund this past Fall. It is thrilling for me to receive all of your letters of support and I want to share our progress to date.

In 2003 we raised enough funds for 60 girl students and in 2004 we were able to increase this to 75. We are still working towards our target of scholarships for 90 girls this year, but I am extremely pleased to report that we have already exceeded last year by providing 78 scholarships so far! Your support has such a tremendous impact, literally enabling the female students to continue their education.

I hope that these stories and images will help bring the school to life for you and give you a window into the world of especially the female students. We thank you all for your generous support.

PARTNERSHIP PROJECTS



Girls Learn International: Summit 2006, New York City

On April 30, 2006 I attended the 3rd annual Girls Learn International Summit in New York City as a representative of The Fabindia School. Girls Learn International (GLI) is a US-based non-profit organization with chapters at 30 schools in Northeastern USA that involve students to engage in the international effort for global girls' education. The Fabindia School is the "Partner Classroom" with the GLI chapter at the Horace Mann School in Riverdale, New York. In addition to a pen-pal relationship, the students at Horace Mann also hosted a fund raiser for the girls at the Fabindia School this spring. Gabby Bromberg, an 11th grader, is the student chair of GLI at Horace Mann. She writes, "The Horace Mann chapter of Girls Learn International raised \$750 dollars at our bake sale last week. We are giving this to the organization to be sent over to your school. We hope it makes a difference." Gabby's younger sister Talia, an 8th grader at The Churchill School in New York City, was so inspired by the Horace Mann students that she and her

classmates also decided to do a fund raiser at their school.

This spring the Churchill School students organized a bake sale which raised \$300 for girls at The Fabindia School. It was wonderful to meet the Bromberg sisters at the GLI Summit and thank them personally for their leadership roles. On behalf of the students and staff at The Fabindia School, we send our tremendous thanks to the Bromberg sisters and all their classmates for their amazing commitment and selfless efforts!

At the GLI Summit students from all the chapters shared compelling information about global girls'

education and presented "Lead Her Awards" to an impressive line up of inspirational women. The honorees included NY Senator Hillary Rodham Clinton, NY Representative Carolyn Maloney, editor-in-chief of Glamour Magazine Cindi Leive, and activists Gloria Steinem, Amna Buttar and Mukhtar Mai. Mukhtar Mai, a Pakistani woman who has established a school for girls in her village in Punjab, Pakistan, received a standing ovation from the crowd and the greatest praise from her fellow award recipients. Mukhtar

Mai, called the "Bravest Woman Alive," gave a short speech in Hindi and said her slogan is "End Oppression with Education." I felt very honored to represent the Fabindia School at this inspiring event.

The Fabindia School was established by William and John Bissell who saw the need for a model school to empower young people in rural Rajasthan where literacy rates are extremely low, especially among women. From the beginning the school has been committed to encouraging education for girls in a region where most parents who can afford an English medium school would send only their sons. To attract girls the school subsidizes their tuition. Starting in 1992 with 11 pupils, the school now has over 250. The John Bissell Scholars Fund was established in 2000 in memory of John Bissell. Its purpose is to support scholarships for female students.
