
Permanently Endowed Scholarship

The Fabindia School was established by William and John Bissell who saw the need for a model school to empower young people in rural Rajasthan where literacy rates are extremely low, especially among women. From the beginning the school has been committed to encouraging education for girls in a region where most parents who can afford an English medium school would send only their sons. To encourage and promote female students, the school subsidizes their tuition. Started in 1992 with 11 students, the school now has 785 students. The John Bissell Scholars Fund was established in the year 2001 in memory of John Bissell. Its purpose is to support scholarships for female students.



10th ANNIVERSARY OF THE JOHN BISSELL SCHOLARS FUND

I remember a phone call ten years ago from Charley Todd, an educator and family friend, informing me that he and my nephew William Bissell had been discussing the need to create a fund-raising organization in the U.S. for the Fabindia School, and he wanted my reaction. I was thrilled with the idea of an entity that would fund scholarships for girls at the school because I knew that women's education was not a priority in much of India. Charley, who had served 28 years as a school head, volunteered to coordinate this project and I was eager to help.

It struck both of us that it was appropriate to name the fund in memory of my brother, John Bissell, who had supported the school from the start and who was deeply committed to equal education for girls.

We sent out our first fund-raising letter in 2001 and received gifts from 30 donors. Since then this relatively small, but expanding community of dedicated supporters have collectively achieved an amazing milestone – \$500,000 in donations







Thanks to the generosity of so many, the school has become a model for education in rural Rajasthan. Opening with 11 boys and girls in 1992, it has grown to nearly 800 students with 39% girls from pre-school through Class X11. It has provided a top-quality English language education to over 7000 students. In what was once a bare, arid plot of land, a series of bright, airy buildings stand, with 24 classrooms, a library, computer center, two science labs, playground, and sports field.

On visits to the school I have witnessed how strongly the climate supports equality for girls, who hold many leadership positions and speak up with confidence in class discussions.

Many of you reading this have helped to make these achievements possible and we are tremendously grateful for your support.

2011 is sure to be a historic, life-changing year for four Fabindia students who have received full scholarships to attend American educational programs at the Hotchkiss School and the Loomis Chaffee School. We look forward with great excitement as the Fabindia students come to the US and we hope that these wonderful partnerships will continue to flourish over the coming years. We feel truly honored by what these two top American schools have done for the children and the school. While the Fabindia School has hosted many overseas volunteers and visiting students, this is the first time that our students will have the opportunity to travel abroad for an educational program. We can't wait to hear all about their experiences and share their stories with you.

Hotchkiss Summer Portals, Lakeville, CT, USA

For three weeks from June 26 through July 17, 2011, two Fabindia students – Aditi "Tina" Rathore (Class IX) and Nishank "Raja" Bhati (Class IX) - will be enrolled in the Hotchkiss School Summer Portals Environmental Studies program in Lakeville, CT. With very generous financial support from The Hotchkiss School and enormous assistance from our champion Patricia Redd Johnson, Senior Associate Dean of Admission, the students will be receiving full scholarships to cover their tuition and travel costs, making it possible for our top students to enroll with a need-blind admissions policy. The two Fabindia students will learn from and live with 30 teachers and 90 students from around the world. They will be conducting labs, traveling on field trips and exploring nearby ecosystems across Northwestern CT.

PATRICIA JOHNSON OF THE HOTCHKISS SCHOOL VISITS THE FABINDIA SCHOOL

My trip to the Fabindia School was nothing short of amazing. The Fabindia School is a green school which is state of the art in a rural section of Bali, Rajasthan. The architecture lends an air of grace to the buildings and the school is accessible to all kinds of students. The students were strong willed, competent and clearly comfortable in their setting.

Speaking to the students was a delight. I asked what questions did they have for me. Their hands shot up and I thought, "whew" now here are some quick minds. One student asked, "If I came to an exchange program at Hotchkiss, what could I bring to the students that would be of interest to them?" Now I must tell you that this question gave me food for thought. I told them "It would be wonderful if you could demonstrate your beautiful dance to us." (They had performed a beautiful dance upon my arrival.) I also thought, later on, it would be interesting to bring our history to them, especially since the founder of our school is Maria Bissell Hotchkiss, a distant relative to the same Bissell family who founded the Fabindia School.

What I did determine pretty easily was that though these young students lived in rural India, it was not indicated by their behaviors, nor their attitudes. They were very sharp in their questioning and were quite lucid about what they thought that they might see in America. When I asked who might be willing to come to an exchange program, they seemed to be quite interested to come. In my observation of the entire school and teachers, I saw a sophistication that was truly remarkable in the Fabindia students. The Fabindia School is indeed "putting its money where its mouth is" for the greater good of society.

Two Fabindia girls (Shaily Jain and Shefali Sankla) both entering Class XI, have been accepted to the Loomis Chaffee School for academic year 2011-12.
